# **Lorne is a wandering Winter wonderland!**

Winter is just around the corner with the whales set to visit our shores, and the walks and waterfalls coming alive with the wintery weather. Lorne and its backyard are a great place to explore nature's beauty in the cooler months.

Our first whales have visited us in early May in the last few years, and usually continue to pass through until October with June, July and August seeing the most sightings.

Southern Right whales frequent our area, with migrating humpbacks travelling through and the odd

The giant visitors are easy to spot from many of the vantage points along the Great Ocean Road and use the calmer waters of Louttit Bay to shelter and frolic, creating a true winter attraction for our shoreline. Mothers and calves may visit for a fleeting moment or stay all day, making Lorne and surrounds the most amazing places to laze around over the winter months.

The whale blog will be active at www. visitgreatoceanroad.org.au/whale-sightings, where visitors and locals alike can view sightings, report sightings and sign up for whale alerts.

The blue and white whale flag will again be flying at the Lorne Visitor Centre when a whales are sighted in Lorne and along the coast.

Visitors and locals are encouraged to report any sightings through the blog so that everyone can enjoy these majestic giants.

Frequent hot spots in Lorne can be North Lorne, the rock groyne, the main beach and the pier, and for a birds eye view, above Big Hill or Teddy's lookout. The whales can be viewed from any vantage point along the Great Ocean Road, just remember to obey traffic rules and pull over safely.

You may see a lazy tail slap or even a breach and if you're lucky, you may even hear them singing their amazing tunes.

While the whales are around, the winter wonderland of the Great Otway National Park comes alive, and with the rain, the waterfalls start flowing behind Lorne

Visit one or all of the 10 waterfalls within a 10km radius behind Lorne and take advantage of the majestic rainforest in our backyard. Take an easy stroll or get more active with over 50km of marked tracks, our backyard is bigger than you think and can take days, if not weeks, to explore. As we say, if it's raining, go to the rainforest!

To explore the waterfalls behind Lorne, grab a copy of the free Lorne Walks and Waterfalls map from the Lorne Visitor Centre, and ask one of the friendly staff and volunteers for suggestions.





Visit Lorne and stay and night or two or even a week with one of the many accommodation providers and relax and recharge in one of the many cafes and restaurants while watching the whales or after exploring our natural backyard.
