LORNE HISTORICAL SOCIETY GETS A "MAKEOVER"

Those of you who have visited the Lorne Historical Society's premises will know that it's not exactly the ideal space to manage, maintain and display the Society's collection. Situated in a downstairs room at Lorne Community House, opposite the Information Centre, it has an entrance off the walking path that goes from the bottom of Otway Street through to the roundabout.

It's a small space and offered limited display capability to say nothing of limited space to store the collection.

Now, with the generous support of the Surf Coast Shire, our premises are getting a "makeover". Everything in the building was stored in a 20 foot shipping container which the Shire supplied, whilst their tradesman changed the wall configuration to make the space more usable, gave the place a fresh coat of paint and sanded and re-polished the floors. The Shire also covered the cost of installation of reverse cycle air conditioning and through a minor community grant, we received a further \$5,000 to purchase additional storage and display equipment. We are grateful to the Shire for their support and we are confident that when everything is complete, it will be a whole new experience for visitors.

Some time ago, the Society commissioned a professional historian to complete a "Significance Assessment" of our collection. This assessment follows guidelines established by the National Library of Australia. It involves an inspection of the collection, identifying items of national, state and regional significance and reporting on the state of the collection and its management.

The historian found that the Society had amongst its collection a number of items of national significance particularly in relation to the construction of the Great Ocean Road and many more items of state and regional significance.

We have now engaged the same historian, to guide us in management and display of our collection in our newly made over home. We have decided to break the collection into three parts:

- Photographs
- Artefacts and objects
- Research library

For some time now we have been digitally scanning the photographs in the collection; there are over 2,500. In the next few months we will complete the task of digitizing the whole collection. From time to time we will arrange themed displays using the photographs; Ocean Road, fishing, timber industry, guest houses for example. However we will have the added luxury of being able to display a digital image upon request without rummaging through over 100 storage boxes!

We will have special display facilities to display some of the more interesting pieces in the collection and we are currently undertaking an update to the catalogue of all artefacts and objects in the collection.

There is much material pertaining to Lorne and the region in books, written interviews, scrapbooks etc. and this will form part of the research library. We are particularly grateful to Graham and Joan Wheal and Malcolm and Jean Graham for their dedication to maintaining and amassing the collection. Malcolm and Jean Graham produced over 2,000 typewritten pages of extracts from newspapers and other records related to life and events in Lorne from 1840s onwards. This collection, over 15 volumes, has now been scanned and converted to searchable text making it a very accessible source of material for research.

There is still much to be done and we are a small band of volunteers. We welcome any further assistance. The more help we get the sooner the refurbished home of the Lorne Historical Society will open again.
