# **ORNE MEN'S SHED** VS **THE COCKATOOS** PUT YOUR BET ON THE MEN'S SHED!



We are all aware of the enormous problems caused by sulphur-crested cockatoos getting into waste bins around Lorne. The Surf Coast Shire is implementing strategies designed to tackle the problem of cockatoos by ensuring that waste bins are secure and not accessible to the birds.

The first strategy is to ensure that waste bins on the main street are secure. In order to do that, the Shire will be replacing waste bins on Mountjoy Parade with "Big Belly" waste bins which incorporate a solar powered compactor which increases capacity to over 600 litres, four times the capacity of a regular waste receptacle. The most important feature is that the bins are "cockie proof". There is a set of "Big Belly" bins, which were installed over a year ago for evaluation, near Kosta's corner. Following the trial, Shire has now committed to install a further six sets and hopefully, GORCC will follow suit and replace open waste receptacles on the Foreshore.

The second of the Shire's strategies to eliminate the problem of cockatoos getting into rubbish is to ensure that the lids on domestic waste bins are securely locked, preventing the cockatoos from opening the lid, distributing rubbish to the four corners of Lorne and dining on inappropriate food. In order to do this, Shire proposes to install "Gravity Locks" on every domestic waste bin in Lorne. The Gravity Lock is designed so that the lid of the bin must be unlocked with a key in order for the homeowner to deposit rubbish in the bin. The lock prevents cockatoos from opening the bin.

On rubbish collection day, when the bin is placed on the road reserve, it is still locked, thus preventing the cockatoos from "bingeing". When the waste collection truck picks up the bin and tips it upside down to empty the contents, the lock automatically releases when the bin is in this position. When the bin is put back on the ground, it automatically locks again. The keys supplied for locks are all the same and it's important to lock the bin lid and remove the key from the lock when your place the bin out for collection.

It is expected that these two strategies will have a dramatic effect on the availability of food for the cockatoo population.

Installing another six sets of Big Belly bins is a job for the Shire. Installing a Gravity Lock on over 2,500 domestic waste bins in Lorne is an entirely different job. And that's where the Lorne Men's Shed steps in.

The Shire has contracted the Lorne & District Men's Shed to undertake the installation of the Gravity Locks. The Shire has provided the locks and also provided

the Shedders with appropriate training in installation procedures and relevant safety procedures. It is noteworthy that the diversity of skills and work experience of the Shedders meant that they were able to contribute to the design of a "template" for installation of the lock and to source its production in order to streamline the process of installation.

Now that the Shedders are fully familiar with the installation process and have the new tooling, we are off and running with the Gravity Lock installation. After just a couple of weeks, the process of fitting the lock has been refined and the Shedders are working efficiently as teams. The result is that the time to fit a lock is now down to just over 5 minutes.

We have teams of 6-8 Shedders working over three weekdays and Saturday mornings. Monday is the busiest day because the bins have just been emptied and we try to get as many completed as possible with two teams working. Other shedders cover the rest of the days. The Shedders donate their time, be it all day, a morning or an afternoon.

Our system at present is to collect the bins and bring them to the shed for fitting. Now that the word is out, local residents are collecting their own and their neighbours' bins and bringing them down to the Shed. This is also speeding up the process. It's also interesting to see the number of people who just want to "drop in" and see the Shed in operation.

The Surf Coast Shire have provided a set of plans of Lorne showing the numbered house lots and we mark off each location when the bin has been fitted with the gravity lock.

The members of the Lorne & District Men's Shed are now well underway on an important project for the whole of the Lorne community. The  $\operatorname{cockatoos}$  are in for a big surprise over the next couple of months as they find fewer and fewer opportunities to "lift the lid".

On a side note, it is wonderful to see the number of men from the Lorne community participating in the project. On any given day when the Shed is open, it's likely that there will be in excess of a dozen men helping out on the project in a variety of ways and sharing a "cuppa" in the breaks. It's different men on different days so we are very pleased that the Lorne Men's Shed is providing this opportunity for involvement and camaraderie to so many men in our community. After all, that's what the Men's Shed is all about.
