THE GREAT OCEAN ROAD

– WHO WERE THE MEN WHO BUILT IT?

In March 2018, it will be 100 years since construction work began on the Great Ocean Road. In March of 1918, The Great Ocean Road Scheme brochure was published. The scheme was to build a road in memory of the Victorian soldiers who died in the 1914-18 war and employ returning soldiers. Later in that same month, The Great Ocean Road Trust was established at a meeting in Colac. The Anzac's Highway was proposed as the name for the road.

Construction of the road proceeded over the next 10 or so years as different sections were surveyed and constructed, with celebrations and official openings at various stages as the more difficult sections of the road were completed. The records indicate that the Great Ocean Road Trust advised that the Great Ocean Road was open from Geelong to Warrnambool in 1932. It still required sealing.

During this time, over 3,000 workers were involved in the construction and about 2,400 of those were returned servicemen. As we approach this centenary event we are reminded about how little we actually know about those returned servicemen who worked tirelessly in difficult and hazardous conditions to create the world's largest War Memorial and such an iconic destination for Australian and International tourists.

The Great Ocean Road Trust probably had records of those workers included with many other records related to the construction of the Ocean Road. Those records, correspondence, images, movie footage etc., were all stored in a warehouse owned by Howard Hitchcock, the Chairman of the Great Ocean Road Trust, in Geelong. Hitchcock had founded and managed a film production company. When World War II broke out, it is believed that the records related to the construction of the Great Ocean Road were destroyed to make room for material related to the War. It probably didn't seem that the records were that important at the time, but as with so much of this material, the real loss only becomes apparent with the passage of time.

The late Iain Grant of the Portland Family History Group, started to investigate whether there was a list of the names of the returned servicemen in response to a request from a person enquiring about information about a relative who had worked on the Road. In 2007, Iain Iaunched a campaign to try and gather the names of those workers. He worked tirelessly; contacting history groups all around Victoria, giving talks at interest groups, contacting the media and government organisations to try and find information from

any source he could. Iain in his own words said that the many people and organisations he approached applauded his efforts and made promises of help but very little eventuated.

He stated in an address to a History Group in 2008; "It then becomes as much a story about a journey, that may not in fact have an end. It may always only be about the quest for knowledge, and information that is gleaned slowly over many years and from diverse sources, until at a point in the future, we can honestly say that we have done all that we humanly can, to compile this list of dedicated brave blokes, whose main aim was to build a monument to their mates who paid the ultimate sacrifice, and whom would never see the bright sun, smell the gum leaves, or see the glory of the wattle in bloom, of this wonderful nation Australia, ever again.


And what a marvellous, living, breathing, wondrous, picturesque, and awe inspiring memorial to our brave diggers it has become."

The Lorne Historical Society worked closely with lain trying to collate a full list of names. lain passed away about three years ago and his wife Anne presented to the Lorne Historical Society the records that lain had compiled during his research over the previous seven years. Iain, with the help of many people, had compiled the names of about 390 of the servicemen who worked on the Great Ocean Road, a figure still well short of the estimated 2,400 workers. lain and the then President of the Lorne Historical Society, Jean Graham believed that many of the records would have been held by the Country Roads Board (CRB) and subsequently passed over to what is now Vicroads. From the minutes of various meetings it appears that Vicroads were reluctant to admit they had records and were certainly not going to make them available, citing Privacy Policy.

As we approach the centenary, it would be a wonderful gesture if Vicroads would make available any relevant material so that we can ensure that the servicemen who constructed this magnificent Memorial can be properly recognised.
